About Young Water Speaks

<u>Young Water Speaks - Youth Storytelling Contest</u> is Waterlution's 2020-2022 youth project. It is a national storytelling educational project that provides video resources and special webinars hosted by Waterlution's <u>Youth Advisory Board (YAB)</u> volunteers, Indigenous and non-Indigenous guest storytellers (like Allie).

Young Canadians gain the tools to connect with water and the creativity to generate captivating stories about this precious resource which can be submitted to the contest. The contest is divided into 3 different age categories (ages 7-10, 11-13, and 14-18) within 4 separate regions in Canada. The program is being funded by the Government of Canada and is being delivered in both official languages.

The free YAB volunteer-led workshops provide classes and youth groups story-creation training to learn to generate ideas inspired by water (and the rich connections water has to history and cultures). These workshops guide youth on developing characters, storyboards, and selecting a creative outlet (creative writing, visual arts, videography etc.) to share their water story. All participants can submit their water story creation in the contest, and be eligible for prizes sponsored by LUSH and United Blue Clothing. Submissions also have the chance to be featured in the **Traveling Storytelling Exhibit in Summer 2021** curated by the YAB volunteer team

About Allie Rougeot

Allie Rougeot is an Economics and Public Policy student at the University of Toronto. She moved from France to Toronto, Ontario for university. She has been an environmental and human rights activist for the past 10 years and has focused her attention on climate justice since high school. In January 2019 she took on the role of coordinator for the Fridays for Future in Toronto. Fridays for Future is a worldwide movement where students have been striking and protesting to demand bold climate action from all levels of government. Allie has been recognized for her work by the Canadian Voice of Women for peace with the Kim Phuc Youth Award, Toronto Post Magazine in "20 under 20", and Corporate Knights "30 under 30". Allie believes climate change is a complex issue, and that both mobilizing to demand climate justice and actually co-creating solutions to climate change can pass through powerful storytelling.
